- IMPORTANT. NO ENTRY FORMS WILL BE ACCEPTED ON DAY OF SHOW. The Committee insist on entry forms being received by THURSDAY EVENING. They can be sent or TELEPHONED to the Secretary (Tel: 01494 881000) or a Committee member or presented at the Village Hall from 7-9 p.m. on Thursday, 8th August 2024. The entry fee is 30p for all adult Classes. Telephone entries to be paid for on Show morning.
- If in doubt re staging or exhibiting, please ask Show Stewards on morning of show.
- All exhibits, etc. must have been grown by Exhibitor except for those in Classes 73 to 75.
- Classes 1, 2, 4-16 & 24-43 will be judged under R.H.S. Rules, Classes 3 and 73 to 75 by local judges and Classes 76 to 98 under WI Rules.
- 5. Exhibitors to provide own bowls or vases.
- 6. Exhibitors may only make ONE ENTRY in each Class.
- The exact number of articles as shown in this Schedule is to be exhibited, otherwise the exhibit will be disqualified.
- All entries are shown at their owners' risk. The Committee do not accept responsibility for loss or damage to persons or property at the Show.
- 9. Judges' decisions to be final.
- 10. All exhibits to be staged and THE HALL CLEARED FOR JUDGING BY 10.45am, Hall OPENS at 8.00am.
- 11. Classes open to local residents only are restricted to amateurs living within 2 miles of Lane End.
- 12. The Novices' Section 1 is open to any local resident who has never won a prize for these vegetables at this show before.
- Anyone may enter under the respective classes. Exhibitors DO NOT have to be members of the Horticultural Society or Women's Institute.
- 14. Distribution of awards will take place at 4.15 p.m. before which no exhibits may be removed - preceded by the Auction at 4.00 p.m. Exhibitors are asked to leave their exhibits for auction, if possible, to assist the Society. It would help if Exhibitors would advise the Show Stewards during the afternoon of items to be auctioned.
- 15. Prize money will be distributed to winners at 4.30 p.m.
- 16. FRUIT CAKE RECIPE (Class 77). 8ozs self raising flour, 1 tsp. mixed spice, 6ozs soft brown sugar, 6ozs butter or margarine, 3 large eggs, 14oz mixed fruit, 2ozs cherries, 2ozs ground almonds, 1 tblsp. Alcohol (optional). Bake for 2-2½ hours at 140°C/275°F/Gas mark No 1, in 7"-8" tin.
- 17. VICTORIA SANDWICH (Class 78) 6ozs butter or margarine, 6oz caster sugar, 6oz SR Flour, 3 eggs, pinch of salt. Bake in two 7" tins at 375°F or No 5 for approximately 20 minutes. When cool, sandwich with red jam and sprinkle top with caster sugar.
- 18. Wine must be in plain corked wine bottles not screw-tops.
